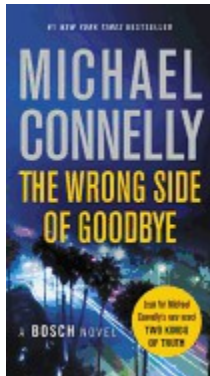

Book Reviews

The Wrong Side of Goodbye by Michael Connelly (2016)



Detective Harry Bosch must track down someone who may never have existed.

Harry Bosch is California's newest private investigator. He doesn't advertise, he doesn't have an office, and he's picky about who he works for, but it doesn't matter. His chops from thirty years with the LAPD speak for themselves.

Soon one of Southern California's biggest moguls comes calling. The reclusive billionaire is nearing the end of his life and is haunted by one regret. When he was young, he had a relationship with a Mexican girl, his great love. But soon after becoming pregnant, she disappeared. Did she have the baby? And if so, what happened to it?

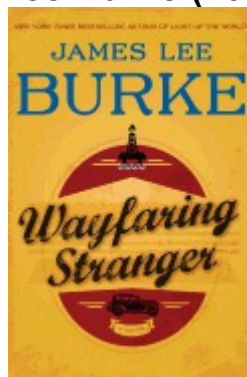
Desperate to know whether he has an heir, the dying magnate hires Bosch, the only person he can trust. With such a vast fortune at stake, Harry realizes that his mission could be risky not only for himself but for the one he's seeking. But as he begins to uncover the haunting story--and finds uncanny links to his own past--he knows he cannot rest until he finds the truth.

At the same time, unable to leave cop work behind completely, he volunteers as an investigator for a tiny cash-strapped police department and finds himself tracking a serial rapist who is one of the most baffling and dangerous foes he has ever faced.

Swift, unpredictable, and thrilling, *The Wrong Side of Goodbye* shows that Michael Connelly "continues to amaze with his consistent skill and sizzle" (*Cleveland Plain Dealer*).

After Not reading Connelly for several years I've now read 2 of his books in the last couple months. This one I picked up at the Prague, Czech Republic airport while Claudia & I waited for our long flight home. I had another book that just didn't seem likely to meet the need for a long, boring flight. I have no regrets! Connelly came through in a big way and the 12-hour trip seemed more like 5. I was engrossed the whole way. A great read and another A rating.

Wayfaring Stranger by James Lee Burke (2014)



"WAYFARING STRANGER begins in West Texas in 1934. At age sixteen, Weldon Holland encounters Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker traveling with their accomplices after having just pulled off one of their notorious armed robberies. Weldon is smitten by Bonnie, but because of Clyde and Bonnie's duplicity and the disrespect they show his grandfather, Weldon ends up putting a bullet through the rear window of Clyde's stolen automobile. The story then jumps to 1944 and the Ardennes Forest and the Battle of the Bulge, where Second Lieutenant Weldon Holland saves his sergeant, Hershel Pine, from death by suffocation when he is buried alive in his foxhole under the treads of a Waffen SS Tiger tank. Weldon and Hershel survive the executions of the wounded by the SS and escape on a freight train deep into Nazi Germany. There, they stumble into an extermination camp deserted by the SS, and discover among

the stacked bodies a young woman named Rosita Lowenstein, who is not only a remarkable woman but a relative of Rosa Luxemburg (known as "Red Rosa," whose mother's name was Lowenstein). Eventually, Weldon will make her his bride, and the three friends will return to Texas to seek their fortunes. But when Weldon, Hershel, and Rosita form a pipeline corporation, they enter the domain of jackals known as the oil business. They meet Roy Wiseheart--one of the wealthiest men in Texas and a former Marine aviator haunted with guilt for deserting his squadron leader over the South Pacific--and Roy's wife Clara, a vicious anti-semitic who is determined to make Weldon and Rosita's life a nightmare"- It will be the frontier justice upheld by Weldon's grandfather, Texas lawman Hackberry Holland, and the legendary antics of Bonnie and Clyde that shape Weldon's plans for saving his family from the evil forces that lurk in peacetime America and threaten to destroy them all"--

The Last Place God Made by Jack Higgins (1971)



An action-packed adventure set in the unforgiving and uncharted Amazon.

Neil Mallory thought life was interesting as a bush pilot, flying mail and supplies around the Amazon rain forest. Then, after a bad crash, his life was saved by Capt. Sam Hannah, who all but hijacked him as a junior partner in what could

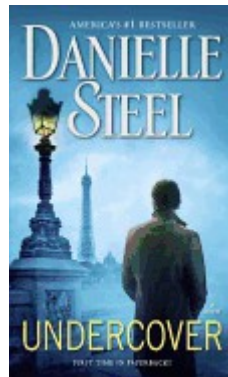
barely be called a business. Only then did life get *really* interesting.

Flying to and from the darkest corners of the savage jungle, the motley pair thinks they've seen everything . . . until they discover a field covered with the bodies of dead missionaries riddled with the arrows of the dreaded Huna tribe. The Huna, who have no love for encroaching "civilization," are not to be trifled with. But as luck would have it, Mallory and Hannah soon find themselves drawn into the search for two missing nuns not accounted for among the victims of the massacre.

The ensuing hunt will pit them against the Huna, the dangers of the Amazon, and even each other in a bloody fight for survival more brutal and unrelenting than either could have imagined--even in their nightmares.

Vintage Higgins. Excitement from the first page to the last, crisply written with characters to love and hate. I give it a solid B and will always recommend Higgins to all readers of fiction.

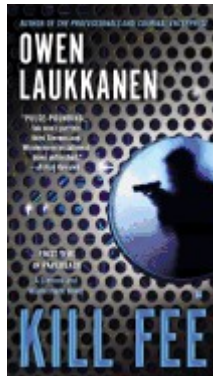

Once again, Danielle Steel has given me a thriller I enjoyed and can highly recommend. It's not the high energy of many current thrillers nor is it racy or excessively violent. It's just a well written, interesting novel with principal characters you can really like and cheer for. I give it a B+.

Kill Fee by Owen Laukkanen (2014)

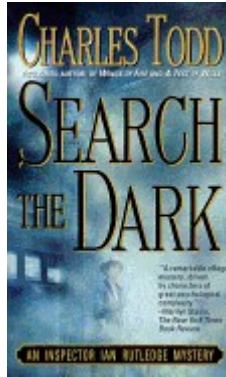


The billionaire picked a heck of a way to die. On a beautiful Saturday in downtown Saint Paul, Minnesota, state investigator Kirk Stevens and his occasional colleague FBI special agent Carla Windermere witness the assassination of one of the state's wealthiest men. The shooter is a young man, utterly unremarkable--except in his eyes. There is something very wrong in his eyes. And it's only the beginning. The events of that sunny springtime day will lead Stevens and Windermere across the country, down countless blind alleys, and finally to a very flourishing twenty-first-century enterprise: a high-tech murder-for-hire social media website. But just who has the dead-eyed shooter targeted next. and who's choosing his victims? That's where things get complicated--;Provided by publisher.

Kill Fee is Laukkanen's 3rd book and, as good as his earlier books were, this is, in my opinion, his best. A very interesting premise well developed and presented. Stevens and Windermere make a great team. I give it an A-.

If you like C J Box, Steve Martini, Karin Slaughter, or Steve Hamilton I think you'll really like Laukkanen.

Search the Dark by Charles Todd (1999)



A dead woman and two missing children bring Inspector Rutledge to the lovely Dorset town of Singleton Magna, where the truth lies buried with the dead. A tormented veteran whose family died in an enemy bombing is the chief suspect. Dubious, Rutledge presses on to find the real killer. And when another body is found in the rich Dorset earth, his quest reaches into the secret lives of villagers and Londoners whose privileged positions and private passions give them every reason to thwart him. Someone is protecting a murderer. And two children are out there, somewhere, in the dark....

This is an English mystery but the author is American and the writing style is more American than British. Set in the aftermath of WW I and as timely as today's headlines regarding the affect of war on those who fought, Ian Rutledge, a veteran himself, sensitively investigates a brutal murder that on the surface seems easily closed, but somethings just don't fit right. Very well written, I give it a B+ and offer it to those who haven't read Todd as a good option to pick-up.
