

His parents, sister (Tracey) and girlfriend (Kenzie) form a loving support staff that enables him to endure tragedy and disappointment during the year's course.


His distinct and unique talents allow him to thrive in an environment of pressure, ultimately allowing him to make decisions that will put him on a path of success.





But she was a perfect housekeeper. Everybody said so.

Maybe she wasn't the best looking or the smartest. Maybe she wasn't

important like her beautiful, brilliant older sister. Maybe she wasn't even a very great clerk at Hy-Vee. Maybe she sometimes blundered and said too much or not enough but—She was a perfect housekeeper. Always that.

And especially on Christmas Eve. She'd just checked out the loops of evergreen swagged perfectly from the mantle...the fairy lights and the glittering fall of tinsel on the perfectly symmetrical tree...the perfectly balanced wise men and shepherds around the stable in the nativity scene....

And across this perfection, this night, had run a mouse. Other women would have sworn. Or cried. But for what this meant to Gerda, those reactions would've been too shallow. For Gerda the presence of this mouse was a violation—of her whole life, her whole sense of who she was. A perfect housekeeper would never have a mouse in her house.

When she moved she bumped into her dust-free coffee table.

That evening she felt disorientated in the church she knew so well, in the service she always enjoyed so much. The candles, the carols, the noisy excited children, the wreaths draped from the pew ends (that weren't quite perfectly symmetrical)—all seemed distant, alien, as if they belonged to another life or another person. Maybe that's why the childrens' sermon caught her attention—because she felt different.

The sermon was about a Christmas legend. On the first Christmas Eve, according to that story, just at midnight, the animals spoke, donkey and ox and cow and sheep. And if you listen carefully, the minister said to the wide-eyed or squirming children, the animals still may do so. Only on Christmas Eve. Because that's a special time that makes things different. That makes us different.

Gerda thought of the mouse in her perfect house. And shuddered.

She eased open the door when she got home, glanced quickly, fearfully around. All was calm, the tree was bright. She didn't pause, as she usually did, to look with wondering pride on her handiwork. The work of ordinary, unimportant Gerda!

But not tonight. She went up the stairs quickly, hardly noticing the railing under hand, made into a sweet silken flow by lemon polish. When she got into bed, she pulled up the covers and curled into a ball. She was trembling like a small animal. It was a high-pitched steady humming that woke her. She thought it was the alarm clock and rolled over and reached out a hand to silence it.

Her groping fingers touched something soft. Softer than velvet. Like the very softest down. And just under the softness, something small and hard and angular. The softness and the hardness were vibrating.

A second. And then it was gone, the sound and the softness and the hardness, and her fingers lay on empty air. Yet not quite empty. The air seemed to hold the sound and the shape and the softness, the incredible softness.

She knew what it was. And jerked back her hand. Revulsion rose like vomit into her throat. The mouse. The dirty, vermin mouse. The mouse that had ruined her perfect house, made her something other than she was....

And yet at the same time the touch on her finger was unlike anything she'd ever known. Like—it sounded crazy—like a touch from some place she'd never been but somehow recognized...and—loved....

She lifted a hand to her face. Her cheeks were wet. They'd mess up her nice clean pillow case.


She smiled.

Untamed by Elizabeth Lowell (1993)




A hero of the crusades, Dominic i.e. Sabre has returned to Scotland in glory and triumph to claim his reward: the beautiful Saxon bride awarded to him as conqueror king. But Lady Margaret of Blackthorne cannot yield to the bold Norman invader.

The beloved daughter of a sacred tribe of Celtic mystics, she fears an ancient curse that could bring further turmoil to her battle-scarred land...and sorrow to her marriage bed. With a word, the lady could turn her wedding into war.

But there awaits in the noble knight's embrace a promise of passion unbound and a love that neither violence nor treachery can tear asunder, a love both invincible and Untamed.

OK. Historical Romance it not my main fare! However, I picked up Untamed in and audio book and decided to give it a shot. I'm glad I did. It was a fast, engaging book with characters to like, hate, respect, distrust and generally an interesting mix. Meg & Dominic are central and both are exceptionally strong willed making for a potential explosive relationship. There is enough romance, sex, violence and deceit to sate the hunger of most readers. I enjoyed it and give it a B. Not an historical romance fan?? Maybe it's just because you don't want to be seen in that section of The Book Rack or with that kind of book in your hand. Just ask us to double bag it. And, we won't tell. However, you may find a new genre to occasionally sample. I did.

The Fifth Witness by Michael Connelly (2011)




Attorney Mickey Haller has fallen on tough times. He expands his business into foreclosure defense, only to see one of his clients accused of killing the banker she blames for trying to take away her home.

Mickey puts his team into high gear to exonerate Lisa Trammel, even though the evidence and his own suspicions tell him his client is guilty. Soon after he learns that the victim had black market dealings of his own, Haller is assaulted, too--and he's certain he's on the right trail.

Despite the danger and uncertainty, Haller mounts the best defense of his career in a trial where the last surprise comes after the verdict is in.

Connelly has always been a good seller for us and I'd read one of his Harry Bosch series several years ago, but not picked up another of his books to read since then. Not because I didn't enjoy him, but just because there are so many other authors I knew nothing about. On the spur of the moment I grabbed The Fifth Witness and tore through it. It was very exciting and kept me fully engaged from the first page. I give it an A- and strong recommendation. If you like David Baldacci, Harlan Coben or Scott Turow, and haven't read Connelly, pick up a few of his books the next time you're in The Book Rack.


The Highway by CJ Box (2014)



When two sisters set out across a remote stretch of Montana road to visit their friend, little do they know it will be the last time anyone might ever hear from them again. The girls and their car simply vanish. Former police investigator Cody Hoyt has just lost his job and has fallen off the wagon after a long stretch of sobriety. Convinced by his son and his former rookie partner, Cassie Dewell, he begins the drive south to the girls' last known location. As Cody makes his way to the lonely stretch of Montana highway where they went missing, Cassie discovers that Gracie and Danielle Sullivan aren't the first girls who have disappeared in this area. This majestic landscape is the hunting ground for a killer whose viciousness is outmatched only by his intelligence. And he might not be working alone. Time is running out for Gracie and Danielle Can Cassie overcome her doubts and lack of experience and use her innate skill? Can Cody Hoyt battle his own demons and find this killer before another victim vanishes on the highway?

Have you read CJ Box?? If not, you should add him to your must read authors, if you like William Kent Krueger, Steve Hamilton, Margaret Coel or JA Jance! The Highway is a "grab you by the lapels and drag you in until the last page" book. It starts quickly and keeps building until the climax, I give it a B+. The quality of writing and the creativity of the plot both are top drawer.

Last Snow by Eric Van Lustbader (2010)



Jack McClure, Special Adviser and closest friend to the new President of the United States, interprets the world very differently from the rest of us. It's his greatest liability, and his greatest asset.

An American senator, supposedly on a political trip to the Ukraine, turns up dead on the island of Capri. When the President asks him to find out how and why, Jack sets out from Moscow across Eastern Europe, following a perilous trail of diplomats, criminals, and corrupt politicians. Thrust into the midst of a global jigsaw puzzle, Jack's unique dyslexic mind allows him to put together the pieces that others can't even see.

Still unreconciled to the recent death of his daughter and the dissolution of his marriage, Jack takes on a personal mission along with his official one: keeping safe from harm his two unlikely, unexpected, and incompatible companions— Annika Dementieva, a rogue Russian FSB agent, and Alli Carson, the President's daughter. As he struggles to keep both young women safe and unearth the answers he seeks, hunted by everyone from the Russian mafia to the Ukrainian police to his own NSA, Jack learns just how far up the American and Russian political ladders corruption and treachery has reached.

On par with his Bourne books and similar books by Jason Matthews and Tom Clancy, Last Snow is gripping and seemingly plausible! Fast paced and in the top echelon of thrillers. I give it an A- and strong recommendation.


A Mortal Terror by James R. Benn (2011)



In 1943 in the midst of World War II Lieutenant Billy Boyle finds himself in pursuit of a serial killer with a particularly frightening agenda. Billy is sent to Caserta, Italy, to investigate the murders of two American officers stationed there. The MOs are completely different, and it seems like the officers had no connection to each other, but one frightening fact links the murders: each body was discovered with a single playing card: the Lieutenant, the ten of hearts; the Captain, the jack of hearts. The message seems to be clear if the murderer isn't apprehended, the higher ranks will be next. As the invasion at Anzio begins, Billy needs to keep a cool head midst fear and terror as the killer calculates his next moves.

This is a SOHO Crime novel and typically well done and a bit different than the top selling mystery and crime authors. The setting is very well depicted, with pervasive mud and cold of the Italian winter and the violence and death of war forming the backdrop for a well conceived story. I give it a B+ and solid recommendation. Benn has written several Billy Boyle novels, so when you read and enjoy one, you'll have more to sate your appetite!

The Black Widow by Daniel Silva (2016)



Legendary spy and art restorer Gabriel Allon is poised to become the chief of Israel s secret intelligence service. But on the eve of his promotion, events conspire to lure him into the field for one final operation. ISIS has detonated a massive bomb in the Marais district of Paris, and a desperate French government wants Gabriel to eliminate the man responsible before he can strike again.

They call him Saladin . . .

He is a terrorist mastermind whose ambition is as grandiose as his nom de guerre, a man so elusive that even his nationality is not known. Shielded by sophisticated encryption software, his network communicates in total secrecy, leaving the West blind to his planning and leaving Gabriel no choice but to insert an agent into the most dangerous terrorist group the world has ever known. She is an extraordinary young doctor, as brave as she is beautiful. At Gabriel s behest, she will pose as an ISIS recruit in waiting, a ticking time bomb, a black widow out for blood.

Her perilous mission will take her from the restive suburbs of Paris to the island of Santorini and the brutal world of the Islamic State s new caliphate, and eventually to Washington, DC, where the ruthless Saladin is plotting an apocalyptic night of terror that will alter the course of history. "The Black Widow" is a riveting thriller of shocking prescience. But it is also a thoughtful journey into the new heart of darkness that will haunt readers long after they have turned the final page.

What more need I say than Silva is a master and you should read him every chance he gives you. This book is as timely as tomorrow's headlines, but far more readable! Gabriel Allon is at worst one of the top 3 protagonists in the

thriller genre. I give it an A+ as a must read!

To Save the Sun by Ben Bova (1992)



Ancient Earth Is Doomed! Its sun will explode, not millions of years hence, but in mere lifetimes – violently enough to scour Earth clean and leave the Empire of the Hundred Worlds adrift. For the handful of "primitives" left on Earth are the baseline for humanity's ever-diversifying genetic stock. Every other human world sends regular delegations to check their own genetic pool against "Earth normal." Now the center will hold no linger. The Empire's scientists deem that nothing can be done. The age of heroism is past; this is the long, stagnant afternoon of the human race. Until – over massive opposition – a single young woman makes her way to the Emperor with that rarity, a new scientific insight... and a plan, flowing from its implications, to mobilize humanity's slumbering energies toward a millennium-long effort of applied astrophysics. Of engineering carried out on the hearts of stars. A plan to save the Earth. A plan to save the Sun.

I enjoyed this book. It covered not only the astrophysics (superficially), but mostly, human dynamics. While the empire had developed means of extending human life well over a hundred years, the Emperor was prohibited from benefiting from the technology to insure transition. They could prolong the life of the scientist by employing cryogenics while she traveled between planets. She had to use diplomacy to resolve a planet threatening civil war that would prevent the saving of the sun. I give it a B and recommend it to you. If you like Isaac Asimov, Gregory Brin or Arthur C. Clarke, make sure and pick up one of Ben Bova's titles.
