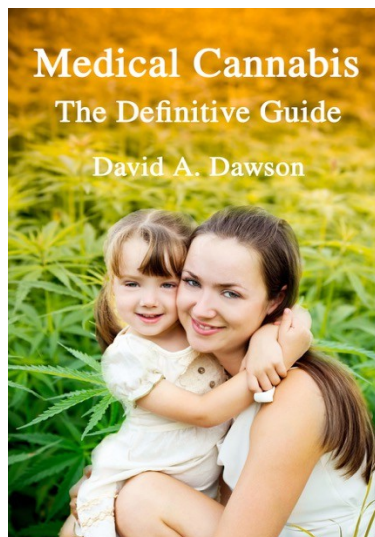

About David

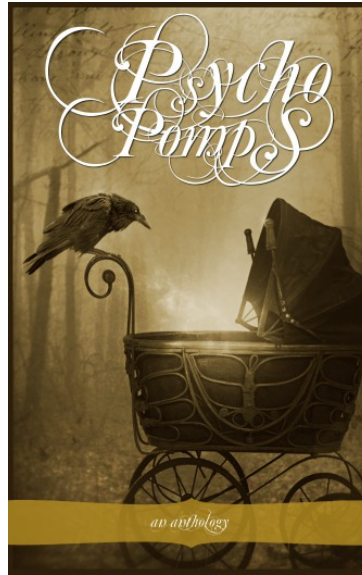
There were times when I was on the opiates when I couldn't engage in a coherent conversation. I was on Hospice for a number of months in Arizona (Hospice is the group they give you to when doctors have given up and you're going to die). My family brought me out of Arizona and put me in an Illinois Federal Government Housing Facility so I would be closer to them and they could take care of me while I died. Generally when I make this statement, people tend to have a somewhat visceral reaction, but you have to understand, in death situations family members have to adapt in ways that provide themselves methods of dealing with the circumstance while allowing their own lives to continue. It's natural. This also allowed me time necessary to deal with my own situation and figure out how to handle it.

At the time I wasn't really particularly interested in dying. So I started researching alternatives. One of the alternatives I researched was medicinal cannabis. I really hadn't consumed any cannabis since college and unlike Bill Clinton, in college I inhaled deeply and frequently. At that time I became aware that there was, in addition to the usual effects of smoking cannabis, a reduction in my pain. I was eventually able to obtain a supply of medicinal cannabis from a friend from Colorado. It worked. It took me a couple of weeks to wean myself off of the morphine and the cannabis took care of any pain issues I was experiencing and it's now the only thing I medicate with.

I don't tell you this story to give you some drama of "Medical Mary Saved my life", because whether that's true or not, it's meaningless. What does have meaning are the tens of thousands of research studies demonstrating that cannabis is safe and effective medicine for a wide array of debilitating medical conditions.

I have now been researching medicinal cannabis for five years and currently use my biology degree to specialize in medical cannabis research and development. I do not consider this book the culmination of my research, but rather a continuation because the science and technology in this field of medicine is continuing to evolve. It is so fascinating for me that I can't help but stay at the forefront.

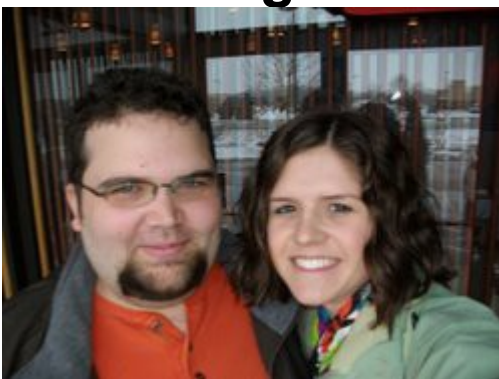

He invites you to come along with him on his journey.

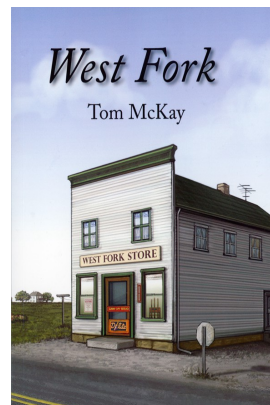

Writing Fiction:

The Long and Short of It

In 2014, East Hall Press at Augustana College published my novel, *West Fork*. I am grateful to The Book Rack for selling *West Fork* in its stores. I am also thankful to be part of a fiction writers critique group. The six writers meet each week to critique a chapter of a novel or short story by members of the group. Generally, two writers are critiqued each week. The entire manuscript for *West Fork* went through this process to

the book's great benefit.

On occasion, members hit a rough patch in their writing or have personal business that prevents producing a piece to share with the group. For such weeks, I sometimes volunteer to produce a quick piece of very short fiction for the group to critique.

Stories under 1000 words are often referred to as flash fiction. The stories I write to fill voids in our group schedule fall under this guideline, although I am not sure how flashy they are. I do know that very short stories are fun to write. The following is one that I produced for my writers group. It numbers 570 words.

Junk to Think About

Buck ran his fingers through his long, scraggly beard then let his hand come to rest on his beer belly. He always checked his beard for crumbs after eating. It seemed too bad that he was working and couldn't actually have a beer with his lunch. It also didn't seem fair that at fifty-five his spotty beard was thicker than his hair. Letting it grow long down the sides didn't count, either. After all, he had had long hair since he was nineteen.

He put his hand over his mouth and smothered a belch. He would have let out a good one, but the kid was sensitive about that kind of thing. That didn't seem right to Buck—a sensitive junk picker. They spent most of their days driving the alleys in Davenport and across the river to hunt down broken dinette chairs, rusted fence wire, and the occasional lucky little piece of copper tubing.

Buck wondered if he and the kid should be embarrassed to be seen together.

They couldn't have been much more different, Buck with his hair down to his shoulders and the kid with a haircut that would have made a Marine proud. The kid had on a clean pair of jeans and sweatshirt everyday, too. That didn't figure either. The kid had to know they were just going to get dirty by the middle of the morning.

Buck wasn't a slob about things. Maybe it looked like he wore the same clothes everyday, but he had three of his red muscle shirts. He rotated them pretty good. Good enough for a junk picker, at least, and nobody was getting him in a sweatshirt that covered the tattoos running up both his arm. They'd been there for years, but it hurt plenty when they were done. He was damn going to show them off. Besides, he sweat enough as it was.

Nobody could call him a fanatic about his tattoos. He even changed some and gave himself the nickname Buck when he and Sharon got married. It was the only thing he could think of to do with the four letters tattooed across the fingers of each hand. He didn't figure the kid would ever have that problem. Buck could see a person not liking tattoos, but he thought it wouldn't hurt the kid to loosen up a little. If he even had one of those tiny earrings you barely noticed it would be something.

Still, he couldn't complain about working with the kid. It had been more than a year, and the kid always did his part. Skinny as he was, he didn't mind latching on to one end of a heavy water heater while Buck took the other. Somehow, the kid was the more responsible one between them even though Buck owned the truck and ran the business. He knew the kid would be the one to fold up his paper lunch bag and say it was time to get back to work. Just once, Buck would have been happy for the kid to lean back and let them slack off for a while. He could see it wasn't going to happen today.

“Think we should get back to work, Dad?” the kid said.

Buck just smiled. You raise them, you do your best, and at some point they go their own way. Always was like that. Always will be.

Book Reviews:

Desolation Row

All I Did Was Shoot My Man: A Leonid McGill Mystery by Walter Mosley (Riverhead Hardcover, \$26.95, 336 pages)

“And the only sound that’s left/ After the ambulances go/ Is Cinderella sweeping up/ On Desolation Row.” Bob Dylan

All I Did Was Shoot My Man is the fourth in a series of Leonid McGill mysteries by Walter Mosley. This time an abrupt ending creeps up out of nowhere and doesn’t quite seem to relate to the closure of the rest of the plot – there are likely plans in place for a fifth book. McGill introduces characters and events in a unique way that sometimes works and sometimes is frustrating. Often plot twists are dropped on the reader as if they should know what’s going on, but these elements do not always come together or make total sense for a couple of pages or chapters. Perhaps this may sometimes keep the reader’s interest level high, but it backfires at other times.

In this story, Zella Grisham murders her boyfriend for cheating on her, and McGill, a private investigator, allows himself to get pulled into proving her innocent of a crime for which she is falsely accused. The proof involves a massive amount of money and a large international company.

The real perpetrators of the crime eventually come after McGill, threatening him and his family until McGill – who seems to have a love-hate relationship with just about every character in the book – manages to connect the dots.

McGill’s family is another story altogether. Mosley uses the family by attempting to create

some sense of normalcy within the chaos. The characters have a rather bizarre definition of family, but they are one. There are kids from multiple parties and partners, both married and otherwise, that form relationships built on varying combinations of love, convenience, and desperation.

Fortunately, the characters created by Mosley are interesting. It is this fact that there are relationships and personalities, rather than just action and events, that makes this a better book than most of its kind.

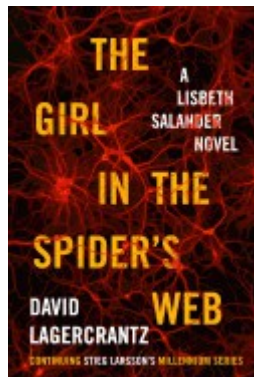

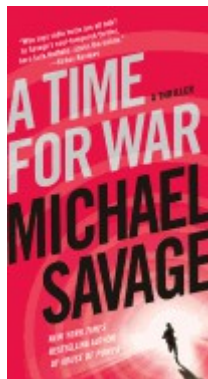

Blomkvist, in desperate need of a scoop for "Millennium, " turns to Salander for help. She, as usual, has her own

agenda. The secret they are both chasing is at the center of a tangled web of spies, cybercriminals, and governments around the world, and someone is prepared to kill to protect it . . . The duo who captivated millions of readers in "The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo, The Girl Who Played with Fire, "and" The Girl Who Kicked the Hornet s Nest" join forces again in this adrenaline-charged, uniquely of-the-moment thriller."

After reading The Girl in the Dragon Tattoo and the two original sequels, I embarked upon an exhaustive search for the next Steig Larsson, reading many, many books by authors from around the globe. I found few disappointments, but rarely any who I felt were close to Larsson's talent. When I discovered "Spiders Web" was to be released I had to read it to see what Lisbeth & Mikael were into this time and to measure it against Larsson. Well, it's a very good book! If you enjoyed the original trilogy, you will want to continue with this book. It's worthy of being added to the set. It's not written by Larsson and that is clear early on. I give the originals a 10/A+ on my "insightful" rating scales and I give "Spider's Web" a 9.5/A. Order it from The Book Rack, or add it to your request list, but make sure you get it one way or the other!

A Time for War by Michael Savage (2013)

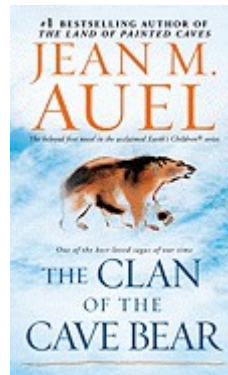


Now "The Savage Nation"" radio host is back with another pulse-pounding thriller that will keep readers hooked until the very last page. A Chinook helicopter carrying a squad of Navy SEALs suddenly plummets to earth in Afghanistan. A car driven by FBI agents tailing a suspicious vehicle is mysteriously rendered immobile in San Francisco. The body of a Chinese agent is found floating miles from the Golden Gate Bridge after being fed to sharks. The United States is under secret attack, and only Jack Hatfield, a popular television host hounded from his position by left-wing forces in the media for speaking the truth, suspects the danger of this lethal conspiracy. With the help of Dover Griffith, an idealistic young female staffer at the Office of Naval

Intelligence, Hatfield pursues a trail leading to a billionaire American electronics entrepreneur who has sold out his own country with the help of officials at the highest level of the American government. As enemy operatives plan a two-pronged attack that will disarm the American military and release a deadly toxin killing hundreds of thousands of civilians, it's up to Hatfield and Dover race to locate this new Ground Zero--and save their country from the greatest threat it's ever faced. And time is running out..."Power fiction, tinged with terrorism and intrigue, with an old-school, rough-and-tumble journalist as its hero."

Jack Hatfield and Dover Griffith, along with Jack's friends, make a formidable oponent for anyone trying to damage the United States. Laced with current political rhetoric, it's still a good thriller. If you like William J Johnstone's thrillers, I'd bet you'll like Michael Savage's books. I give it a B.

Clan of the Cave Bear by Jean Auel (1980)

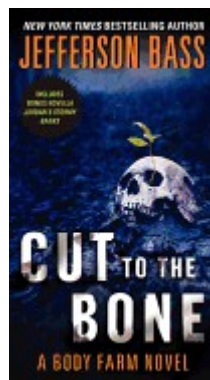


This novel of awesome beauty and power is a moving saga about people, relationships, and the boundaries of love. Through Jean M. Auel's magnificent storytelling we are taken back to the dawn of modern humans, and with a girl named Ayla we are swept up in the harsh and beautiful Ice Age world they shared with the ones who called themselves The Clan of the Cave Bear. A natural disaster leaves the young girl wandering alone in an unfamiliar and dangerous land until she is found by a woman of the Clan, people very different from her own kind. To them, blond, blue-eyed Ayla looks peculiar and ugly--she is one of the Others, those who have moved into their ancient homeland; but Iza cannot leave the girl to die and takes her with them. Iza and Creb, the old Mogur, grow to love her, and as Ayla learns the ways of the Clan and Iza's way of healing, most come to accept her. But the brutal and proud youth who is destined to become their next leader sees her differences as a threat to his authority. He develops a deep and abiding hatred for the strange girl of the Others who lives in their midst, and is determined to get his revenge. Jean M. Auel's Earth's Children series has sold more than 45 million copies

worldwide and includes "The Clan of the Cave Bear, The Valley of Horses, The Mammoth Hunters, The Plains of Passage, The Shelters of Stone, " and "The Land of Painted Caves." Her extensive research has earned her the respect of archaeologists and anthropologists around the world. She has honorary degrees from four universities and was honored by the French government's Ministry of Culture with the medal of an "Officer in the Order of Arts and Letters."

This book is very thoroughly researched and imaginatively expanded into a fascinating first installment of prehistoric life. I listened to it on audio book and was fully engrossed from the beginning.. I give it a B+ and recommend it to you.If you like books by W. Michael Gear, Kathleen Gear, Sue Harrison or William Sarabande, you'll like Auel.

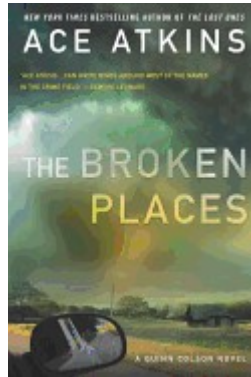
Cut to the Bone, A Body Farm novel by Jefferson Bass (2013)



In the summer of 1992, Arkansas governor Bill Clinton and Tennessee senator Al Gore begin their long-shot bid for the White House. On a sweltering hillside in Knoxville, Dr. Bill Brockton, the ambitious young head of the University of Tennessee's anthropology department, launches a unique some say macabre research facility. Brockton is determined to revolutionize forensics to help solve homicides. But his plans are derailed by a chilling murder that leaves the scientist reeling from deja vu. Followed by another. Then another: bodies that bear eerie resemblances to cases from Brockton's past. The police chalk up the first corpse to coincidence. But as the body count rises, the victims' injuries grow more distinctive a spiral of death that bodes ill for Brockton himself. If the killer isn't found quickly, the death toll could be staggering. And the next victims could include Brockton . . . and everyone he holds dear.

Jefferson Bass is the writing team of Jon Jefferson and Dr. Bill Bass, a world-renown forensic anthropologist..If you like the books or TV show CSI or other serious forensic authors and books, ypu'll like this book and series. It is rather gruesome in spots, but is well done. I give it a B.

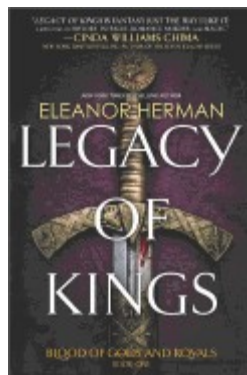
The Broken Places, a Quinn Colson Novel, by Ace Atkins (2013)



A year after becoming sheriff of Tibbehah County, Mississippi, Quinn Colson is faced with a pardoned killer's return to Jericho. Jamey Dixon now preaches redemption and forgiveness, but the family of the woman he was convicted of killing isn't buying it. They warn Quinn that his sister's relationship with Dixon could be fatal. Others don't think the new preacher is a changed man, either--a couple of dangerous convicts who confided in Dixon about an armored car robbery believe he's after the money they hid. So they do the only thing they can: break out and head straight to Jericho, leaving a trail of bodies in their wake. Colson and his deputy, Lillie, have their work cut out for them. But they don't count on one more unwelcome visitor: a tornado that causes havoc just as the manhunt heats up. Communications are down, the roads are impassable--and the rule of law is just about to snap.

If you like Robert B Parker, Michael Koryta or CJ Box, you'll likely enjoy Atkins. I give this book a B.

It has little of the sex, being aimed for the teen reader, but certainly doesn't lack romance, sword play, magic and deceit. I give it an A- and highly recommend it to young adults and old!
