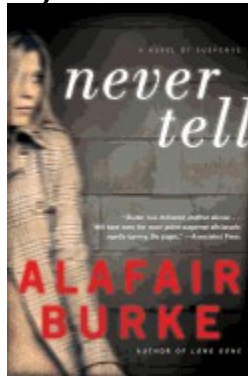

Never Tell by Alafair Burke (2013)

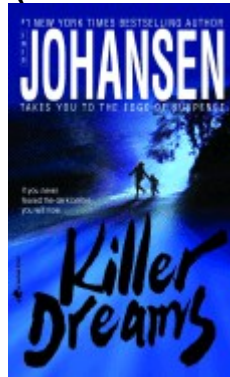


Even a perfect family has its secrets.

Sixteen-year-old Julia Whitmire appeared to have everything: a famous father, a luxurious Manhattan town house, a coveted spot at the elite Casden prep school. When she is found dead in her bathtub, a handwritten suicide note left on her bed, her parents insist that their daughter would never take her own life. But Julia's enviable world was more complicated than it seemed. The pressure to excel at Casden was enormous. Abuse of prescription drugs ran rampant among students. And a search of Julia's computer reveals that she'd been engaged in a dangerous game of cyber-bullying against an unlikely victim. NYPD detective Ellie Hatcher is convinced the case is a suicide, but she knows from personal experience that a loving family can be the last to accept the truth. As she is pressured to pursue a case she doesn't believe in, she is pulled into Julia's inner circle--an eclectic mix of precocious teenagers from Manhattan's most privileged families as well as street kids from Greenwich Village. But when the target of Julia's harassment continues to receive death threats, Ellie is forced to acknowledge that Julia may have learned the hard way that some secrets should never be told.

I don't quite know what to say about this book. I listened to the audio book and it definitely kept me interested and entertained. I'll defer to a professional reviewer to make the case. "What initially appears to be a simple story quickly becomes more intricate and compelling, making the pages fly. Killer Dreams by Iris Johansen (



a knock-out suspense thriller that pits a mother and son against a killer who's the stuff of nightmares.

If you close your eyes, he'll get you. Sophie Dunston knows all too well how dreams can kill. As one of the nation's top sleep therapists, she specializes in the life-threatening night terrors that her ten-year-old son, Michael, suffers from. But she is also an expert in another kind of terror-the kind that can turn a dream life into a living nightmare in the blink of an eye.

Someone is watching. He's a shadowy figure from out of her darkest fears and he hasn't forgotten her. In one shocking moment of violence, he'd shattered Sophie's world forever and left her with only one thing to live for: her son. But the nightmare isn't over for Sophie Dunston. It's just begun. He's been waiting. Sophie was supposed to die the first time around, but fate intervened. This time he'll make sure that not even a miracle will save her.

It wasn't a miracle that saved Jock Gavin, but it was pretty close. A semiretired hit man, commando, and jack-of-all-deadly-trades, he knows what Sophie is up against-and that she'll need help. But the man he's chosen for the job is as unpredictable as he is dangerous. Matt Royd is a wild card-hard, cool, merciless-and putting him into play changes the game completely. But to whose advantage?

Sophie will soon find out. She will have to trust Royd because she has no choices left. Because the bogeyman haunting her dreams is all too real and he's on the hunt again. Because the nightmare he's got planned for Sophie won't end when she wakes up screaming. It won't end. Ever.

It's a B+ in my book. Johansen never disappoints. If you like thrillers by Catherine Coulters, Kay Hooper, Mariah Stewart or Heather Graham you'll like Johansen, and vice versa.

Witch World by Andre Norton (1963)

Andre Norton enthralled readers for decades with thrilling tales of people challenged to the limits of their endurance in epic battles of good against evil. None are more memorable than her Witch World novels. Simon Tregarth, a man from our own world, escapes his doom through the gates to the Witch World. There he aids the witch Jaelithe's escape from the hounds of Alizon, only to find himself embroiled in a deeper war against an even deadlier foe: the Kolder.

A "Cracker Jack" of a classic Science Fiction book. A little supernatural abilities, but not a lot and a hero to admire and support. This first in a series of 10 Witch World titles I'm confident you Sci Fi lovers will enjoy this book and will be rewarded by having 9 more to sate your craving for more. And, Norton has a total of some 464 total titles in case you have to read all her books, once you've finished Witch World. I give it an A-. If you like Norton you'll probably also enjoy Mercedes Lackey, David Drake and L. Sprague de Camp.

The Fourth Assassin, An Omar Yussef Mystery by Matt Beynon Rees (2010)



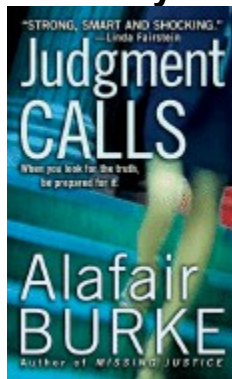
Arriving to visit his son Ala in the heavily Palestinian neighborhood of Bay Ridge, Brooklyn, Omar Yussef discovers the beheaded body of one of the boy's roommates. When Ala is arrested as a suspect, Omar Yussef must investigate to prove his son's innocence, uncovering a deadly conspiracy of international

proportions.

The Jerusalem Post praises *The Fourth Assassin*, "As always, and perhaps more than ever, it is the courage and humanity of Yussef that shines as a solitary beacon through the darkness, implicitly representing the tragedy of such humanity in a world of terrible grief and violence, but also hope that it might someday prevail."

A good book with a setting and characters different from those I usually encounter. A Palestinian police officer from Bethlehem trying to solve a murder in Brooklyn, NY. I found it a little slow, but still enjoyed it as a change of pace and new territory and perspective. I give it a B.

Judgment Calls, a Samantha Kincaid Mystery by Alafair Burke (2004)



An apparently simple assault case spirals into a complex web of violence and deception in this bold debut thriller. Deputy District Attorney Samantha Kincaid walks into her office in Portland's Drug and Vice Division one Monday morning to find three police officers waiting for her. A thirteen-year-old girl has been brutally attacked and left for dead on the city's outskirts. Given the lack of evidence, most lawyers would settle for an assault charge; Samantha, unnerved by the viciousness of the crime, decides to go for attempted murder. But as she prepares for the trial, she uncovers a dangerous trail leading to an earlier high-profile death penalty case, a prostitution ring of underage girls, and a possible serial killer.

Seamlessly moving between courtroom and criminal investigation, *Judgment Calls* reveals not only an insider's knowledge of the justice system but a fresh new voice in the world of crime writing. 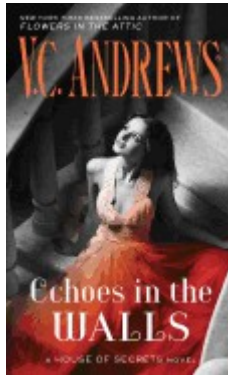
Recent and Upcoming New Releases:
