
LEGENDARY is the story of two young men who meet and fall in love during Operation Pied Piper in WWII, where children were evacuated from London to avoid the Nazi Blitz. The bulk of the novel takes place ten years later as James and Arthur set off on a near-mythic quest to find the answers behind a loved one's mysterious last words. On the way, their legendary love, always so meant to be, is tested as they navigate England in 1953, where homosexuality is illegal and punished by prison time or worse.

The goal of this novel is to reach young LGBT people so they can read a story where nobody "buries the gays", where a destined love like King Arthur and Guinevere happens for a same sex couple, and everyone lives happily ever after. There is still a hole on the library shelf for books like this, though it is thankfully getting smaller each day.

Amelia Kibbie grew up in a small town in Iowa with friends, family, and teachers that planted the seeds of her creativity and lovingly nurtured them. After the creative writing unit in Mrs. Stoll's third grade class, she never stopped writing, producing everything from short stories to novels to adorably cringey fan fiction. Her work has appeared in the literary journals *Saw Palm*, *Quantum Fairy Tales, Intellectual Refuge*, and *Wizards in Space*. Her short stories can be found in the anthologies *Humans Wanted* and *My American Nightmare: Women in Horror*, as well as the *Running Wild Press's Anthology of Stories Vol. 2*. Amelia spends her days as an instructional coach in a small-town secondary school and works with students experiencing barriers to success in the classroom. This is her 13th year in education. She lives in lowa City with her husband, young daughter, three spoiled cats, and a shy ghost.

Book Reviews


Still Life, by Louise Penny (2006, Mystery), is first in a series.



Set in the small Quebec village of Three Pines, Inspector Armand Gamache and his team arrive to investigate the death of a well-loved retired schoolteacher, Miss Jane Neal. We meet residents of the quiet village: Artists Clara Morrow and her husband Peter; acerbic elderly poet Ruth Zardo; Olivier Brulé and Gabri Dubeau, the gay couple who own the village Bistro; and bookseller Myrna Landers, all of whom appear in Penny's subsequent books. Surprisingly, Jane's folk art painting, Fair Day, has been accepted for the local exhibition. Painted the final day of the county fair, they all remember it was the day Peter and Clara had to tell a childhood friend that his mother had died while he was out of town. Despite that sad recollection, Jane invites the village friends to have drinks after the opening of the exhibition...in her living room. As long as the friends have known Jane, none has been beyond her kitchen, so this is a significant and intriguing invitation. As Jane's death moves toward a murder investigation, we find out more about the characters and Jane's painting, as well as what Jane has been protecting beyond her kitchen. While I don't believe this is the best book of the series, I recommend reading this one first. If you like it as much as I did, read

the series in order; character development and their circumstances help understanding in later books. (Reviewed by Claudia)

Conqueror: A Novel of Kublai Khan (The Khan Dynasty) by Conn Iggulden (2011) Historical Fiction



A succession of ruthless men has seized power in the wake of Genghis Khan's death—all descendants of the great leader, but none with his indomitable character. One grandson, Guyuk, strains the loyalties of the tribes to the breaking point, and another, Mongke, brutally eliminates the opposition and dispatches his younger brothers Kublai and Hulegu to far-flung territories.

Hulegu displays his barbarity with the savage destruction of Baghdad and his clash with the Khan's age-old enemies, the cult of assassins. But it is Kublai—refined and scholarly, always considered too thoughtful to take power—who will devise new ways of warfare and conquest as he builds the dream city of Xanadu and pursues the ultimate prize: the ancient empire of Sung China. His gifts will serve him well when an epic civil war breaks out among brothers, the outcome of which will literally change the world.

I would echo these reviews, though not so eloquently. I give it an A. Even if historical fiction is not your genre of choice, give Iggulden a chance. I don't think you'll be at all disappointed.

Dead Lions by Mick Herron (2013) Mystery



The disgruntled agents of Slough House, the MI5 branch where washed-up spies are sent to finish their failed careers on desk duty, are called into action to protect a visiting Russian oligarch whom MI5 hopes to recruit to British intelligence. While two agents are dispatched on that babysitting job, though, an old Cold War-era spy named Dickie Bow is found dead, ostensibly of a heart attack, on a bus outside of Oxford, far from his usual haunts.

But the head of Slough House, the irascible Jackson Lamb, is convinced Dickie Bow was murdered. As the agents dig into their fallen comrade's circumstances, they uncover a shadowy tangle of ancient Cold War secrets that seem to lead back to a man named Alexander Popov, who is either a Soviet bogeyman or the most dangerous man in the world. How many more people will have to die to keep those secrets buried?



It is a very entertaining series and book, but I'd give it a B+. I struggled a bit to follow the twists and turns, which caused my mind to wander and reading to slow and head to nod. If you like mysteries and haven't read Herron, you owe it to yourself to give him a try. I think you'll come back to him at every opportunity.

The Falls by Joyce Carol Oates (2005) General Fiction



A man climbs over the railing and plunges into Niagra Falls. A newlywed, he leaves behind his wife, Ariah Erskine, in the honeymoon suite the morning after their wedding. "The Widow of the Falls," as Ariah comes to be known, begins a relentless, seven-day vigil in the mist, waiting for his body to be found. At her side throughout, confirmed bachelor and pillar of the community Dirk Burnaby is unexpectedly transfixed by the strange, otherworldly gaze of this plain, strange woman, falling in love with her through they barely exchange a word. What follows is their passionate love affair, marriage, and children – a seemingly perfect existence. But the tragedy by which their life together began shadows them, damaging their idyll with distrust, greed, and even murder. What unfurls is a drama of parents and their children; of secrets and sins; of lawsuits, murder and eventually redemption. Set against the mythic historic backdrop of Niagara Falls, Oates explores the American family in crisis, but also America itself in the mid-twentieth century, The Falls is a love story gone wrong and righted and it alone places Joyce Carol Oates definitely in the company of the great American Novelists. A wonderfully conceived and written book by one of America's great authors. I, too, give it high praise and an A. If you like Anna Quindlen, Alice Hoffman or Wally Lamb, you will likely enjoy Oates.

The King's Hounds by Martin Jensen (2010) Mystery




The newly crowned King Cnut of Denmark has conquered England and rules his new empire from Oxford. The year is 1018 and the war is finally over, but the unified kingdom is far from peaceful.

Halfdan's mixed lineage--half Danish, half Saxon--has made him a pauper in the new kingdom. His father, his brother, and the land he should have inherited were all taken by the new king's men. He lost everything to the war but his sense of humor. Once a proud nobleman, Halfdan now wanders the country aimlessly, powered only by his considerable charm and some petty theft. When he finds an unlikely ally in Winston, a former monk, he sees no reason not to accept his strange invitation to travel together to Oxford. Winston has been commissioned to paint a portrait of the king at the invitation of his new wife, and the protection of a clever man like Halfdan is well worth its price in wine and bread.

But when the pair's arrival in court coincides with news of a murder, the king has a brilliant idea: Why not enlist the newly arrived womanizing half-Dane and the Saxon intellectual to defuse a politically explosive situation? The pair represents both sides of the conflict and seem to have crime-solving skills to boot. In their search for the killer, Halfdan and Winston find seduction, adventure, and scandal in the wild early days of Cnut's rule.

I thoroughly enjoyed this, my first, Danish mystery. A period tale set in 1018 with lords, Vikings, wenches, ladies and sword fights, it's a long way from CJ Box, Michael Connelly and my more common fare, but a much appreciated diversion. A well-crafted story with characters you will enjoy I give it a B+. The first in the bestselling Danish series of historical mysteries, Jensen has 2 additional King's Hounds books in English, and 25+ more novels if you read Danish!!

The Ice Queen by Alice Hoffman(2005) General Fiction



A miraculous, enthralling tale of a woman who is struck by lightning, and finds her frozen heart is suddenly burning. Be careful what you wish for. A small-town librarian lives a quiet life without much excitement. One day, she mutters an idle wish and, while standing in her house, is struck by lightning. But instead of ending her life, this cataclysmic event sparks it into a new beginning. She goes in search of Lazarus Jones, a fellow survivor who was struck dead, then simply got up and walked away. Perhaps this stranger who has seen death face to face can teach her to live without fear. When she finds him, he is her opposite, a burning man whose breath can boil water and whose touch scorches. As an obsessive love affair begins between them, both are forced to hide their most dangerous secrets--what turned one to ice and the other to fire. A magical story of passion, loss, and renewal.

Alice Hoffman is a very creative and skilled writer. Her talent is featured in this book. It's not thrilling, bloody, adventuresome, but it is an enjoyable diversion from my more normal fare. I give it a B. If you like Anna Quindlen, Chris Bohjalian or Wally Lamb you may very well like Hoffman and this title.
